

There was a great turnout for the first meeting of 2014. Our chairman went a little "eccentric" on us, turning 2 offcentre items: an egg-cup with included salt recess (see picture and drawing), and a lattice-lidded box. These were projects requiring precise measurement and tool work, which Robin excels at. Not everything went exactly to plan, but his calmness under stress and quick-thinking adjustments were a model to us all! There's a whole world of off-centre isn't turning which often demonstrated at the club, so hats-off to Robin for reminding us of the interesting and decorative results that can be achieved.








Marking off a diameter onto a work piece rotating on the lathe.







How many of you have used, or seen used, a pair of callipers — or vernier callipers — to mark off a set diameter onto a rotating piece in the headstock, by using the point nearest the toolrest to mark the timber and gauging the other point to ensure the correct diameter is marked up on the wood.

A much safer way of making up a diameter is to use the callipers set to the radius. By cutting a dimple/indent in the centre of the piece, this can be used to place one point of the callipers in the centre before scribing the diameter with the other calliper point. This method eliminates the risk of the callipers catching and being snatched. possibly Also the mark is exact first time.

The safe way is to apply the outer point (the one marking the wood), at between 7 or 8 o'clock position after locating the other point in the centre dimple.
